

Why so catholic? This is a question that has been asked by many Lutherans and other protestant denominations over the last 500 years or so. This question comes especially when we compare our practices and traditions with the Catholic church, which are either the same or similar.

When it comes to baptism for instance we agree on every point, that through it God makes us His children, gives salvation, the forgiveness of sins, gives us the gift of the Holy Spirit, makes us a new creation, and should be given to a new born.

Now on something like communion we are close, but not quite, we both believe in the real presence of Christ in the Sacrament, that it brings the forgiveness of sins, and restores us to our baptismal promises, but they believe something called transubstantiation, which means that due to the character of the priest, he can turn the bread into the body of Christ and the wine into the blood of Christ. Again, close but not quite the same.

We don't practice our traditions because the Catholics do it, but because they either come from Scripture or they point to something from Scripture. This though hasn't stopped us from trying to distance ourselves from them. Take the Nicene Creed for instance, we have the phrase "In one holy Christian and apostolic Church" whereas the original text is "In one holy catholic and apostolic Church." Notice how the "c" is lower case, that is because the original Greek and Latin texts have used a word that meant universal Christianity. It is not a reference to the Roman Catholic Church which uses a "C." Notice though, on Trinity Sunday in June, we will say the word "catholic" in the Athanasian Creed.

It's not about being close to the Catholics, but it's about confessing the "catholic" or Christian faith as handed down to us by the Lord through His Apostles and our ancestors in the Faith.

Blessed are you

The Beatitudes receive little attention, lamented novelist Kurt Vonnegut. "But, often with tears in their eyes, [Christians] demand that the Ten Commandments be posted in public buildings. And, of course, that's Moses, not Jesus. I haven't heard [anyone] demand that the Sermon on the Mount, the Beatitudes, be posted anywhere."

Jesus' Beatitudes have much to teach about selflessness, mourning, peacemaking and more. Jim Berger, author of *Being Sermon on the Mount Christians*, explains that those teachings were once "viewed as a mandate for the faithful." Post-Reformation, they became less law-like and more of a "liberating directive." Berger writes, "For Jesus, being and doing are inseparable. The Sermon is at once theory and praxis. It is not enough to read it or hear it. Jesus intends it to be how we live."

Elder's Report Pilgrim Lutheran Church March 17, 2024



PUPPET SHOWS SHARE GOD'S LOVE IN CAMBODIA



Cambodia's population is extraordinarily young, with 90 percent of Cambodians younger than age 55 and half of the population being younger than 25. Working with pastors and principals, one way that **LHM—Cambodia** reaches the youth population is by hosting puppet shows in local schools. They also bring a supply of various storybooks to each event, so the kids can take the Good News home with them, too.

As children grow older, the LHM—Cambodia staff coordinates soccer competitions, Bible study groups, music concerts, and other events to stay connected and works with pastors and other Christian leaders to maintain ongoing relationships.

In addition to sharing God's Word with children through these puppet shows, LHM staff also reaches school administrators and teachers. Sophany is the vice principal at a school where a recent puppet show shared the story about the Prodigal Son. After the show, staff members summarized the story and emphasized key messages such as how God made heaven and earth; we are all children of God but are lost; God sent His only Son to die on our behalf; and whoever believes in His Name will become His forgiven children.

Sophany was raised in a non-Christian religion but was intrigued by the message. She was uplifted to hear that God loves us dearly and asked the staff members to stay in contact, so she could learn more about Jesus. We pray that the Holy Spirit continues to work in her heart so that she and her family members can learn more about the Christian faith.




